An information meeting for the course will be held at the Five Dock Senior Citizens Hall, Lyons Road, Five Dock on Saturday 30th August 2008 at 2pm.

APHIDS AND MEALY BUGS by Rex Johnson

Many sap-sucking insects, especially aphids and mealy bugs, may cause problems in the orchid house. They usually cluster on the growing tips and buds, or on new growths, where the sap flow is nearest the surface of the plant's tissues. Aphids are usually green but sometimes brown, black, grey or white.

Aphids (green aphids) are oval-shaped insects measuring some 5-6 mm in length. They congregate quite openly on orchid buds and new growths. Although they can be removed easily with a jet of water, they must be washed clear of the plant or they will simply crawl back onto a different site. Their life cycle is comparatively short but their development and reproductive capabilities are so great that they may produce several generations of young during the course of a year. Some adult aphids develop wings and are thus able to establish new colonies on other plants.

Woolly aphids are usually not as prolific as green aphids but these related soft-bodied, sap-sucking insects can colonise an orchid to the extent that they put the plant under considerable stress. Although the woolly aphid is quite small (2-3 mm long), it appears larger because the adult covers itself with a white, woolly 'blanket', which is quite sweet and highly attractive to ants. Once the juvenile aphid has established itself, usually beneath the leaf, it remains in that position permanently. Because of its blanket, it appears to be 10 mm or more long.

Mealy bugs are silver-grey insects (3-5 mm long) that move freely about the plant, often hiding in the leaf axils. Their segmented bodies are covered with a smooth waxy layer and what appears to be a fine dusting of a silver powder; they have several fine hair-like tails. Mealy bugs dislike bright light, clustering in leaf axils during daylight hours and travelling at night. The females lay 100-200 eggs in a white, cotton-like sac. If uncontrolled, mealy bugs will ultimately infest the root system and the surrounding potting mix, as well as the foliage.

Control of aphids and mealy bugs is relatively easy, provided they are attacked at an early stage. Because they all travel during their early development, a surface spray with an appropriate insecticide usually provides adequate control. However, surface sprays provide only short-term protection because they are washed from the leaves

by watering and misting. For heavy infestations, a systemic insecticide may be required. Surface sprays are easy to use and relatively safe; they are readily available from most nurseries, hardware stores and supermarkets. Systemic sprays, which are taken up by the plant and enter its sap stream, are much less safe because they are also absorbed through our skin. All skin should be covered and full-filtered breathing apparatus used when applying these insecticides. I find that Confidor® and House- and-Garden® insect spray, both available in pressure packs, are also quite effective. When using pressure packs, remember to hold the can at least 30 cm from the plant, so that you do not freeze its tissues.

FUNGAL DISEASE CONTROL by Robert Willmott

Most orchid growers traditionally depend upon disease control as the primary, if not sole, means for eliminating disease, and often overlook simple reasons why diseases become established, why they continue to develop, and what might be done to control them. As growers, we should develop a philosophy to disease control that employs all possible components found in cultural, chemical and biological control methods.

Many of the fungal diseases we encounter are waterborne, and the following factors should therefore be considered:

- Grow under permanent structures to control the amount of water that the plants receive.
- Water when there are good drying conditions, normally not too early or too late in the day.
- Employ fans to move drier air into the greenhouse and thus help to dry the foliage.
- Water only when needed, and then do so thoroughly.
- Do not overcrowd plants, as this inhibits drying. Crowding also increases tissue senescence, which makes the flowers and foliage susceptible to fungi, such as Botrytis.

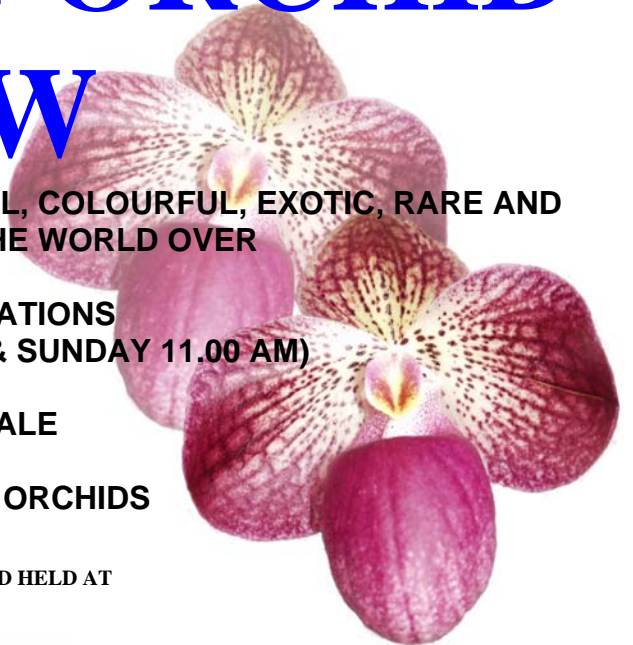

TO MINIMISE WAITING TIME FOR BOOKING IN: All exhibitors are to supply a plant identification card (Monthly meeting card) **Correctly and Clearly Printed in Black** with Class Number, Plant Name, and Exhibitor's name.

1. All entries of exhibits shall be free.
2. Plants will be received at Swanes Nursery on **Wednesday 3rd September 2008 from 4.30 pm to 6.30 pm.**
3. **Definition of a Novice & a Intermediate :** A Novice and a Intermediate shall be determined by the Committee and abide by the criteria set down by the Committee. Novice and Intermediate exhibitors shall be limited to those members of SSOS Inc. who have been identified as Novices or an Intermediate by the Committee.
4. **Entries shall be received on the basis that the Society and Swanes Nursery shall take all reasonable care of the exhibits but shall not be responsible for any loss, destruction or damage to such exhibits and the exhibitors shall have no claim whatsoever against the Society or Swanes Nursery.**
5. All orchid plants exhibited shall have been owned and in the possession of the exhibitors for the preceding six months.
6. All exhibitors must be members of the Sutherland Shire Orchid Society Inc
7. Judging shall be by a panel of Judges nominated by the Orchid Society of N.S.W. Ltd., and shall be conducted according to the Standards of the Orchid Society of N.S.W. Ltd. The Judges decision shall be final.
8. Plants for special prizes, unless otherwise specified, shall be selected from all exhibits in the show.
9. Plants in Class 1 are eligible for Prizes in their respective classes.
10. No award, whether first or second, shall be given if, in the opinion of the Judges, an award is not warranted.
11. A **Seedling** shall mean the complete plant grown from seed and flowering for the **First Time**. For exhibition purposes, seedlings shall retain their status of seedling throughout the flowering season in which they first flowered.
12. Exhibitors shall not remove their plants before the termination of the Show without the approval of the show marshal.
13. The Sutherland Shire Orchid Society Inc. Show Marshals reserve the right to rearrange or reject any entry.
14. Exhibitors should ensure that plants are correctly and clearly marked and that the plants are cleaned of unsightly weeds, dead and badly marked leaves or bulbs. Flower spikes should be staked, if necessary, in accordance with the Orchid Society of N.S.W. Ltd. standards, so that the flowers are shown to their best advantage.
15. Exhibitors are to supply a list of plant names and classes to the Booking-in-person. Exhibitor cards, available from the Show Secretary prior to the Show, are to have **CLASS NUMBER**, plant name and exhibitor's name printed in black.

16. Plant sales are restricted to show exhibitors and or helpers at the show only and must comply with the SSOS Inc. Plant Sales Criteria, a copy of which is on display at all SSOS Inc. Shows. Show benched plants may be sold but can only be removed and placed on the sales table on Sunday morning. Please advise the Show Marshal if you are planning to do this.
17. A member who is under 16 Years of age may exhibit in the Junior Class and must bench his or her plants in person.
18. **Exhibitors in Class 1 must notify the Marshal at least 24 hours before the Show setup.**
Your co-operation in abiding with the Rules and Conditions will be of great assistance.
