IN MY GREEN HOUSE – January 2016

Well Christmas is over and my belly is full, too much ham, pork and those dreaded nibbles, time to get back in the water, for me. Over the festive period I kept the water up to my orchids that was the easy part, now to get back to fattening them up. Water, fertiliser, bug spray and re - pot, time to get to work. I just went for a walk through my green house and had a good look around to find things to write about for this article. Thank heavens orchids live on neglect, I may have to neglect them more often because they all seem to have flourished over the festive season or Santa's helpers paid some unexpected visits! The first orchids I came to are my soft canes, growing in the open, outside my shade house in full sun. New growths popping up in every pot but on closer inspection on some of the leaves there are skeleton patches, green grubs have been at work, tomorrow I'll spray, supposed to be cooler. President Frank called around a few days ago and said his sarcochilus had been attacked, I should have taken the hint and checked then, "dam that festive spiri"t".

Now the good bits, my bulbophylums are throwing new growths all over the place and appear to be multiplying before my eyes, "joy to the world". My Coelogyne are sprouting nice fleshy new leaves and the pseudobulbs are fattening up nicely also and my Laelias are all showing new growth.

As I walk around I am surrounded by quite a few Oncidinae all in flower with nice long inflorescence covered in tiny yellow and brown flowers, so many flowers and no show to go too. Just noticed two stenoglottis, now up to flowering size. These are deciduous orchids that start to produce leaves in Spring. Stenoglottis fimbriata is still only in leaf, but for this plant the leaf is as nice as the flower. As it grows the green leaf is covered in red / brown spots and looks amazing, looks pretty good when it does flower with inflorescence about 20cm high covered in pretty pink flowers, but for some reason when it flowers the spots disappear from the leaves. Maybe somebody can tell me "why is it so". Stenoglottis woodii has green leaves and the short, 10cm inflorescence carry 20 – 40 pretty little white flowers with many little pink spots.

Spanhopia orchids, those highly scented orchids that flower at Christmas time, for most, pop out the bottom of the basket and are usually smelt before being seen, for me are late this year, now in January and just showing the first signs of spikes. I'll blame it on "El Nino".

One thing that can be still done while it is still too hot, besides keeping up the fluids, to your orchids, that is. Is to check your equipment. Spray bottles and pump sprayers will all be needed very shortly to attack those nasties. A good idea is to regularly pull your sprayers apart and check filters and sieves. The two that are often forgotten are the one at the bottom of your bottle. At the end there is usually a little mesh filter that blocks with the gunk in the bottom of the bottle and the other is a small mesh filter in the spray head. Undo the spray nozzle and you should find a little wire sieve type filter this is very fine and is meant to catch the very fine gunk (what a great word, gunk)before it gets to the spray nozzle. When doing these tasks, BE CAREFUL , not to lose little bits and put back together the correct way. If you end up with "bits" left over, you've done something wrong not been thrifty.

You Grew It



Angraecum Magdalenae - grown by Wayne McEvoy

Often referred to as the "Snow white angraecum" or the "Queen of angraecum". There are over 200 species of Angraecum that originate in the Africans. Angraecum Magdalenae is found in Central Madagascar growing at elevations of 800 – 1200m mainly as a lithophytic monopodial species.

Lithophytic meaning rock growing and monopodial meaning growing from a single point, like a vanda. In the mountain area where it grows it is cool with good light and air movement and has a distinct dry period through it's Winter.

The plant has a vanda type shape in that the leaves alternate to each side and as the plant matures will produce "keikes" which will bloom. The plant produces 1 – 5 flowers that are a fleshy crisp large white flower around 7 -10cm with a 10cm "S" shaped spur that last 4 -8 weeks.

This orchid is well suited to a wooden basket or shallow pot. The mix should be quick draining, scoria, charcoal and tree fern fibre are suggestions as this orchid sulks with re potting.

I can grow and flower this orchid in my green house at Engadine without too much trouble. It is magnificent but alas between shows for me, but I'll enjoy. Angraecum are not that hard to grow, require little caring and the rewards are great, have a go at one.

Dendrobium Fleckeri – grown by George

This wonderfully coloured orchid is found in the rainforests of North Queensland, near mountain tops at elevations of 800 – 1500m where it is cool, cloudy with mists and fogs. An epiphyte, commonly referred to as the "Apricot Orchid", due to the colour of the sepals and petals.

Grown in pots with well drained mix or mounted. Given a cool, dryer winter will encourage flowering. The pseudobulbs carry 2 -3 leaves at the end develop 1 – 3 spicy, musky fragrant flowers, thick in texture, that are apricot in colour with a labellum covered in fine white hairs. Easily propagated from keikes, not a big grower, but rewarding when in flower, if you are able to obtain a piece. Grow in a shade house in the Shire.



Maxillaria Tenuifolia – grown by Lee Buivids

Tenuifolia is one of those Species plants that belong in every collection, if not because you grow Maxillarias but just for the pleasant, coconut smell of the flowers, which often is noticed before the flower is seen, as the flower is displayed in the grass like foliage. A single flower of about 5cm will emerge from the base of the pseudobulb. Flowers vary from a pale red to a deep red / crimson with cream spots towards the centre. The lip is a cream with dark red to crimson spots.



Unique with this plant is the way the pseudobulbs grow on top of each other. This looks like one growth with pseudobulbs along the growth but actually each pseudobulb has roots that grow under the papery coating. Propagation is as simple as removing a single pseudobulb and potting up in spag. Or mounting and watching it grow. This compact plant can

be kept compact by taking cuttings or let grown in to a specimen plant that will produce a wonderful display.

Tenuifolia is easily grown in a shade house in Sydney, given ample water to fatted the pseudobulbs, with plenty of light and air movement, has few pest problems. I grow mine hanging high in my shade house. A 200mm pot full can be maintained to a height of about 30cm and will give a great display weather you show it or just take inside when flowering to enjoy the aroma as you pass by.
