New Member Profile

Meet Gavin Curtis. Although he may look it in this photo, he is not currently a professional tennis player. He may well have been one in his pre-orchid life. Now he uses tennis racquets strategically placed around his garden to swat nasty butterflies and moths that are looking to lay eggs in the tops of his orchids. (We all know what havoc those nasty little grubs can wreak on our collections!) Gavin previously raised and bred budgerigars as a hobby. Now he only has one budgie and a

rescued lorikeet in his aviary, but he can certainly talk birds if you want to. He also has some great stories about blue tongue lizards. If you want to talk goldfish, Gavin just happens to know a lot about them as well, as his grandparents had a commercial goldfish farm nearby for many years and Gavin helped out a lot. (Ask Gavin what a hungry kookaburra can do to a pond of expensive goldfish in one feeding frenzy!) Oh, yes, and Gavin knows a lot about native frogs and has many living in and amongst his orchid collection. If you raise your eyebrows and express some disbelief about this claim, Gavin promptly grabs a nearby net and scoops tadpoles out of some of his water features, pointing out the different species evident by the variances in the tadpole colouring.



Gavin only recently joined our Society, but he has been growing orchids for years. And years. He has big specimen-size plants flourishing all around his back yard. Between the driveway and his neighbours' fence, Gavin has built a long, narrow orchid area where currently his soft cane dendrobium collection is hanging in full sun. Cattleyas and cymbids are behind the soft canes. When the soft canes have finished flowering, they all get moved to a shadier bush house area; Gavin rolls the shade cloth down in his driveway bush house and moves the cattleyas and cymbids forward to take advantage of the intensive light, a migration project that Gavin says takes only an afternoon.

In another large bush house, kingianums and speciosums abound, all of which are currently covered in millions of spikes. There are plenty of oncidids as well and the various other orchid bits and pieces that we all seem to accumulate over the years. Gavin has recently bought a

few sarcos and is trialling them in hanging water well pots. They are doing very nicely, oddly enough. Wandering around his yard, you have to ask, "Where is your hothouse?" as it is not clearly evident. Tucked away between the other side of his house and the neighbour's fence, this latest addition to Gavin's growing areas houses his phally collection. Not just ordinary phallies---phallies on steroids. Big fat leaves and so many spikes shooting in all directions makes it difficult to squeeze your way down the aisle without damaging a plant. Amazing.

If you think I'm just having a rave, you clearly haven't been to Gavin's place. Invite yourself over like I did, you won't regret it.

You Grew It

Dendrochilum cootesii exhibited by Sandra & Tony



This miniature size warm to cool growing orchid from the Philippines grows at an elevation of 1200 – 20000m and is found growing on mossy tree trunks on the fringes of cloud covered forests. So when growing this orchid it likes moist, humid and filtered light, with ample air movement. In Winter reduce watering and fertilizing for a rest period.

This orchid has dark green wrinkled pseudobulbs with arching inflorescence that are usually about 9cm in length and in their infancy resemble the tail of a rattle snake. The fragrant flowers are a cream to light green colour, darkening to orange / brown towards the centre and base of the segments, the labellum is off white, however there are pinkies clones also.

This species was first collected by Jim Cootes in 1991 from the Luzon Province and the plant was named in his honour by Professor Hendrik Pedersen in 1997. Jim Coote is a St. George local and is a member of a number of Orchid Societies, one of which is Southside Species Club (meets at Kingsgrove RSL). Jim is renowned for his knowledge on Phillipine orchids, especially dendrochilums, and at Species club astounds us all with his experience in seeing these orchids in their natural habitat that he has visited numerous times.

Restrepia sekellii exhibited by George

These orchids are commonly referred to as "cockroaches". Very easy to grow and grown to specimen size in an 80mm pot. This miniature species comes from Columbia and is grown cool with moderate shade and good air movement.

Flowers develop one at a time at the base of the leaf. The silvery coloured flowers have scarlet spots that get denser towards the centre and will continue to flower many times from the same point.

This species was described by Neville Roper as 'very rare' and is seldom seen on the sales bench.

Restrepias are easily propagated from leave cuttings, place in Spag moss until established.



Epidendrum polbulbon exhibited by George

A dwarf species found throughout Mexico, Nicaragua, Jamaica and Cuba at elevations from 600 – 3200m making this a warm to cool grower.

This orchid has a mat type growth and adapts well to being grown mounted on tree fern, cork, wood or a shallow tray to accommodate the rambling nature of the plant. The single fragrant 3cm flower has orange / brown sepals and petals with a rather large white lip that has purple markings.

Very easy to grow by trimming the growths and either mounting or potting to start off. Spag moss is a suitable medium if growing in shallow dishes, just don't let it dry out.

This orchid has recently gone through some name changes, Epidendrum polbulbon, Encyclia polbulbon, and Dinema polbulbon, which ever you have it is a worthwhile plant to add to your collection weather experienced or novice grower. Grows and spreads well and suffers from few pests and diseases. Keep damp with good air and bright, not direct light.

Glossodia Major exhibited by Richie



One of two species in this genus, named from the Latin major meaning large or big, referring to it being the larger of the two species. This plant has a number of common names – the Large Wax – Lip orchid, Blue Wax – Lip orchid, Parson in the Pulpit and Blue Cockies.

This would be one of Australia's most wide spread terrestrial orchids. Found in all states other than W.A. and N.T. It grows from the coast to the mountain ranges from Central Queensland to S.A.

Glossodia Major has a single leaf that is about 8 – 10cm and 25 -30mm wide, dark green and has fine hairs on both sides. The leaf dies back and disappears after flowering.

The flowers appear on a 30cm long stem and are among the most beautiful in the terrestrial group. The sepals and

petals are similar in size and shape and have a waxy look about them and are a brilliant lilac or purple but can be pale lilac to almost white. The labellum is white with a purple lip. The flower during the day has a slightly vanilla aroma, no doubt to attract the pollinator which is probably a native bee.
