The group can then discuss your plants.


You are invited to bring your purchases along and then we can discuss, as a group, whether they need repotting, mounting ,etc.

IN MY GREEN HOUSE

WOW how good is Spring! We still have some coolish nights but great days (at least it is while I am writing this). Your orchids just love this weather, everything seems to be coming awake and sprouting new, fresh growths.

I went down to fertilize this morning and got wrapped up in just picking up plants and marveling at how they had changed in what seemed to be, overnight.

I know *Laelia anceps* finished flowering months ago but check out next year's flowering grows: they up 2 to 3 cm long already.

Sarcophilus are now in bloom. Mine appear to be later than some growers but, never the less, a spectacular bench display of whites, reds and some yellows. On *sarcophilus*, keep an eye out for the native ones. Personally I think they are outstanding; only small but very nice. *Sarc.falcatus* has pristine white flowers with a yellow or purple lip. *Sarc.olivaceus*, only carries a few flowers but they are a gorgeous yellow / green. They are sometimes hard to keep alive, but in saying that, I have a plant that is mounted and simply labelled 'Bega '09'. I always thought it was some sort of *sarc.* but was unsure where I'd got it from and exactly what it was. About 2 months ago I found it, still alive, so I moved it to a different spot and today it has two flowers: *S. olivaceus*. When I pulled it down to inspect it, a 20mm grass hopper (you know the ones with the chompy jaws) popped out from between the tag and the mount. Well, he is now headless and in a *nepenthe* tube!

My *masdevallias* are all growing very well since I moved them to more light but not as good as Jan's, who boasted 13 flowers on one with another 8 spikes to open, lucky girl !!!

I have noticed that my *stenoglottis* have come out of hibernation and are sprouting their new leaves. These are *S. wardii*, *S. longifolia* & *S. frimbriata*. *S. frimbriata* has very attractive purple spotted foliage that changes to plain green when the flower stalks appear.



Another plant in bud is *Aerides houlettianum*. I have a one of these about 50cm high that I have just moved out of the hot house (taking up too much space) with six flower spikes and a smaller plant with two flower spikes. These have the most beautiful perfume when in flower and the 30 odd flowers per inflorescence are pretty spectacular too.

A very pretty small flower in bud is *Leptotes bicolor* of which I have two plants but different varieties. These get a flower about the size of a 20 cent piece and the flowers are pure white with a stunning purple lip.

Buds, buds and more buds! "Indian dendrobiums" are now well and truly on the way to brightening up green houses. Indian dendrobiums are those orchids that throw out great "grape like" sprays of vibrant colour. They number around 40 flowers per spray. *D.farmeri* has very distinct square pseudobulbs and the flowers are central. A wonderful hybrid of two of these is *D.mousmee* which, if you get a good one, has striking lavender outer petals and sepals: very sort after. These Indian dendrobium flowers unfortunately only last about a week but are a must to have in all collections. Also in bud is the pendulous *D. primularum* most are mauve /pink with a white lip but I have a yellow variety in bud; very nice thanks. Another dendrobium in bud is the miniature, mat forming *D.jenkinsii* (photo on left). This form is best grown mounted, mine is actually in a terra cotta pot but growing over the sides and attaching to the pot. The flowers of this cute small grower are about the size of a 10 cent piece.

Most coelogyne have finished flowering but a small growing, late bloomer is *C. sparsa*, and mine has three spikes. This form only has 3 to 5 flowers per inflorescence but they are clean and clear in colour. They are unfortunately not often seen and are also hard to find.

With all these terrific growing conditions it is not only your orchids that are happy but also the “nasties” are thriving. I told you previously about a grass hopper, I will now be on the look out for more of these critters but there are also other nasties around. Scale loves these conditions, check down the husky coverings on cattleyas, also on soft fleshy leafed orchids like lycaste, and on plants like cymbidiums, sarcs and oncidiums. After the rainy nights, snails become a problem. I actually found one about the size of a 20 cent piece on a nepenthe, up near the roof of my green house.



After buying new orchids at the Spectacular, now is the time to re-pot them. The potting mix they come in probably won't be combatable with your growing conditions and watering regime....so re-pot them. While you are re-potting your new additions, it's a perfect time to attack the rest of your collection that need freshening up.

An afternoon with Heath Myers

Heath's first introduction to orchids was through his grandfather when he was about 10 years old. His grandfather grew cymbidiums in the backyard and worked with Frank Slattery at his Bexley nursery. Heath recalls getting into trouble when he would swap the tags around in his grandfather's pots.

His first orchid was, you guessed it, a cymbidium and gradually he increased his collection by getting given more cymbidiums by his grandfather. When he got older his interest was aroused and he decided to grow orchids for a hobby. He started purchasing some orchids through ebay, mostly cymbidiums. He jokes, that unfortunately he now has a backyard full of cymbidiums. He would like to reduce their numbers in order to concentrate on the other genera that he is now interested in.

One ebay purchase was from a seller who lived at Sylvania, Robert Bisetto. This was *Dendrobium tortile*. When Heath called to pick it up this started a friendship with Rob who introduced him to a greater range of fascinating orchids and was instrumental in Heath joining Sutherland Orchid Society.

Heath started doing odd jobs around Rob's place and probably did most of Rob's re potting. Consequently Rob is probably the main person responsible for Heath's fixation on and great knowledge of orchids. Heath now has less time for cymbidiums (although he has hundreds, maybe many hundreds) and other genera. His favourites now are *Paphiopedilums* and *Phragmipiums*.

Heath's partner Jenny, whose grandfather also introduced her to orchids, enjoys the orchid craze as well. She has a fancy for *Phalaenopsis* and a few other genera. Heath and Jenny have consequently turned their South Hurstville home into a green oasis, as the attached photos will verify.



Their dining room table is full of orchids under fluoro lights. After the kids left home their room was turned into an indoor hot house. The garage is an indoor hot house under lights and the backyard consists of narrow pathways between orchids from fence to fence. The clothes line area became smaller and smaller, and is now used as orchid hanging space. Thank God for portable clothes hoists and a clothes dryer, although you rarely see Heath in anything but singlets. I feel



that they could possibly get two lounge chairs and then get rid of the lounge to give more indoor growing area, just a thought!

The photo on the left is the hot house inside, making good use of the room vacated by the kids.

The photo on the right is the backyard, where every inch is utilized to produce oxygen for the environment...from fence to fence.....from fence to back door! Great use of available space by two people with the same love of orchids, who don't like mowing lawns.

Heath recalls when talking to Phil Spence that Phil said you have to enjoy growing orchids. Specialise in one or two genera and get good at growing these before moving to another type and don't be afraid to try different things and ways of growing.

Heath's suggestion is find an orchid you like, seek as much advice as you can from other growers, ask heaps of questions and don't be afraid to ask no matter how silly the question may seem.

Heath prefers a simple potting mix for most of his orchids – bark (grade to suit) 70%, jumbo perlite 15% & charcoal 15%. His water / fertilizing regime is: in winter, both water and fertilizer (at ½ strength) applied fortnightly; in summer, water 1 to 2 times per week depending on temperature and fertilize at ½ strength (cymbidiums at full strength).

Heath says give growing under lights a try, don't be afraid, the results will surprise you, but you need fans because the plants need plenty of air movement.

ITEMS OF INTEREST

The Southern Orchid Spectacular was held on the weekend and was an outstanding success. Even though the Stadium was difficult to find the attendance was the best it has ever been during the 15 year history of the show with 2,274 people attending. At Caringbah High School, attendance ranged from a low of 1,007 to a high of 1,404 in 2017. The biggest Spectacular prior to this past weekend, was in 2009 at Cronulla Leagues Club when 1,907 people attended.

The Stadium layout worked really well with plenty of space between the displays and vendors. George, Murray and Frank did a fantastic job in working out the layout.

To promote the show, ads were put in the Chinese and Vietnamese newspapers and the Leader as well as an entry in the Leader's *What's On* column. Helen Mason was successful in having an article published in the Leader prior to the show and on various websites. She also distributed flyers and put out signage in the Eastern Suburbs. Jan thanked Frank Zumbo, Chief of Staff of our local MP, Mr Craig Kelly for their massive effort in distributing 38,000 flyers to households in the area. We also did promotions at the Community Transport Network, Probus and Rotary groups, Club on East Sutherland, at the Bushcare Event at Menai, the stall at Sutherland Markets, the front desk of Engadine Bowling Club, other Orchid Societies and in the distribution of the flyers in the Sutherland shire and Eastern Suburbs area. Archie Mitsios promoted our show at his stall at various markets. Posters were placed around the area and on the approach to the stadium to direct people to the stadium.

Social media was more heavily used this year. Herbert Chen set up a page and an advertisement on WeChat, an Asian social media platform that has over 1 billion followers worldwide. Herbert was given a plant in appreciation. Mr Zumbo also posted about the Spectacular on Facebook pages.

We had an greater participation from other societies and groups in putting on a display and all were outstanding and the societies and people who contributed to the displays are congratulated. Jan issued our members' awards to those present.

We had additional vendors this year such as Cut Above Tools and Aussie Shadehouses. The vendors were very happy with their sales results. The community groups we invited were an interesting addition to the show. People were keen to talk to them and purchase honey from the Beekeepers and garden plants from Caringbah and Engadine garden Clubs.

The committee consisting of Frank, Jan, Rhonda, Helen Mason, Gavin Curtis, Murray Aldridge, Irene & Ian Chalmers and Chris Dalrymple did a wonderful job in organising the event. Archie Mitsios

thanked the committee for organising such a wonderful show. He didn't hear any complaints about it.

The volunteers also did a fantastic effort in putting up and pulling down the tables, putting out the black plastic, mats and chairs and the fencing, in manning the crèche and conducting security for display plants. Everyone had a positive attitude and appeared to enjoy themselves. John Costa and Vic Petrovski manned the sales table for the three days and did a great job. Margaret Spring assisted Jan with the show's finances.

A special thanks was given to Wal Chapman and Gary Hart for putting our display together along with Bob Moar and helpers. Rhonda Jackson asked members to applaud Frank and Jan for their outstanding leadership and organisational skills in putting on the show.

On a negative note, one condition of the hall hire was that we were to protect the flooring. After the tables were packed away we found scratches on the floor. We don't know if they will affect our ability to book the hall for next year. Feedback from members was that the food was poor and the variety was insufficient and the food ran out. The committee will think about this for next year.

Speaking of next year, we are looking for a new Treasurer and Secretary for the SOS as Jan and Rhonda are no longer taking on these roles. Jan has been Treasurer of the SOS committee for 10 years and Rhonda has been Secretary for 4 years. If any of you are interested in participating in either of these roles or by being on the committee it would be greatly appreciated. Please let Frank know of your interest.
