## *In My Green House*

Isn't this weather great, plenty of rain about, enough to make ever thing in the garden look green and new but not enough to stop you getting out and looking after you orchids. Warm days and nights it is just great for growing and when things grow and are moist and warm that's when you have to take extra care. Fungus and creepy crawlies are about. To keep fungal problems at bay give your plants a good spray with MANCOZEB, 2 sprays 10 – 14 days apart. If your plants are growing well so will the weeds, keep an eye on them in pots and under your benches.

I am still having trouble with Mealy Bug and scale, I think I've got it all and then pick up a plant in another area and find more. Just goes to show that you have to keep checking all the time and keep up the spraying.

Also I have noticed an increase in Dendrobium Beetles around particularly on the Speciosums in the garden.

I have just worked my little butt off. Took ever thing out of my glass house, replaced an inner lining of plastic, tidied up under all the benches and levelled the benches, big job in a confined area. Then came the good bit putting all the plants back, this time in some sort of order, re potting a few, re staking and tidying up the plants. Wether through good luck or I would like to think good management there were no serious problems.

I have stood a lot of my plants in trays or dishes of water and after Bob Bishop's talk at our last meeting night it was pleasing to here others share the same methods. Not all plants like this method but some certainly do. Water well pots are also an alternative.

Walking around my greenhouse I find surprises in every corner.

I have a number of Dendrochilum in flower with their cascading flower spikes and a number in spike, hopefully in flower for our winter show. I have Oncidiums with wonderful new bushy growth and plenty of flower spikes. Cattleyas, either in bud or with flower sheaths. Made a big, big mistake the other day when moving a specimen plant, moved it in the morning, and didn't take enough care, bumped the new growth and snapped it off. One whole year down the drain, bugger. Lesson, be careful of soft new growths. If you have any Laelia anceps, and ever body should have at least one of these beautiful orchids in their collection, even if tied on a tree in the back yard. Have a look for flower spikes, mine are all in spike. General rule don't stake (unless transporting to a show) let the inflorescence sway in the breeze. Terrific colour and different colour varieties.

One thing that came out of the recent "novices day" was POT SIZE. It is always great to try different things and experiment but don't think that it is easy to put a small orchid into a large pot that way you won't have to re pot for a long time. Also look at the roots, fine, short roots on your orchid don't need a deep pot. For a small plant with fine roots a squat pot just bigger that the root ball is sufficient. For an orchid with short roots a shallow pot or tray is preferable. If you have a plant with big, long, fat roots like a cymbidium your plant needs a deep pot, not too big in diameter but so the root system has room to spread.

On Cybmidiums now is the time you should be cleaning up your plants, removing old husks and unsightly leaves. Watch for flower spikes. Spray with NEEM OIL and spray leaves with MANCOZEB. If your plants area open to all this rain drench with Anti rot or fongarid. Watch out for grubs, grasshoppers and Dendrobium Beetles that all just love munching on new flower spikes.

With all this rain about you may still need to water if no rain for a couple of days or if your plants are under cover and keep up the fertilizer.

Don't forget Castle Hill Show in April and as a tip to new growers, try to stay away from 50mm tubes, spend a little more and buy an established plant in an 80mm pot and re pot in YOUR mix when you get home.

### ***Sutherland Orchid Society Growing Competition***

The SSOS growing competition for financial members will be run as follows:

- The purpose of the competition is to encourage members in growing and caring for seedlings through to the flowering stage.
- There will be two classes - Novice\Intermediate and Open
- Plants will be purchased by the Society. Cost to enter is \$5 for members, SSOS will fund the balance.
- The competition will run over 2 years.
- Plants will be numbered and will be issued to names drawn by ballot from competition entries. The first plant will go to the first name drawn and so on. The member's name will be recorded against the plant number. When benched, the member will put their number on a tag to place in the pot.
- Plants may be benched every 3 months. Plants must be benched at least 5 times during the competition to qualify for winning.
- Judging will be performed by two experienced growers (not necessarily "accredited" judges).
- When plants are benched, points are awarded: 5 for 1st, 3 for 2nd and 2 for 3rd place, based on the best cared for plants. 1 point is awarded to everyone else who benches their plant.
- At the meeting benchings, 1st place from each class will be awarded a SSOS \$5 voucher
- Members from the 2 classes with the most points at the end, wins the competition. The winners will receive a Bunnings or Orchid Trade Company voucher.
- If novice and intermediate growers are promoted by the Society to the next class they will remain the Novice/Intermediate class for the duration of the growing competition.

### ***You Grew It***



#### ***Trichoglottis brachiata* grown by W. & J. Chapman**

This very stunning species orchid is from the Philippines and is found at elevations from sea level to 300 metres which makes it a hot growing orchid. It is generally grown in a basket with a well drained mix or on a tree fern mount. The usual growing pattern is an erect stem that can be trained to climb, where numerous white roots along the stem give the plant a branching affect. The flowers appear along the stem in a zig zag pattern. They have a very waxy appearance, fragrant and richly coloured, with dark purple almost

chocolate brown flowers with a bright fuchsia lip.

This orchid likes lots of water and fertilizer when in active growth, very bright light and frequent misting of its roots especially if hot and dry. As it comes from the Philippines and grows below 300m it would require a heated glass house that does not get below 15 degrees Celsius.

This flower of this orchid is stunning and if you are fortunate enough to have a heated glass house it is worth having a *Trichoglottis* in your collection. A few years ago I attended a Society meeting of the Coffs Harbour O.S. and a member exhibited an orchid of this species. Their climatic conditions are a lot more tropical than Sydney and I am not sure of their growing conditions but their plant was about 40 - 50 cm in height and carried about 50 flowers, the only word for it was spectacular and I was very envious.

### ***Dendrobium monophyllum* grown by Richard Dimon**



This wonderful mini to small creeping *Dendrobium* is found from Cape York Peninsular in Northern Queensland to the northern parts on New South Wales. It can be found in varying conditions from exposed sandstone rock faces to outer branches of rainforest trees growing at sea level to 1000 metres as an epiphyte or lithophytes requiring bright light and constant air movement.

*Monophyllum* has shallow roots and therefore does not require a deep pot. It grows well mounted on an old piece of fence palling, a slab of tree fern or in a shallow "dish" pot. The creeping habit of this orchid that grows into large clumps that has 10 - 20 cm pseudobulbs with a 10 cm inflorescence that can carry up to 20 golden yellow bell shaped, long

lasting, sweet smelling, waxy flowers.

Keep moist and fertilize all year round in a well drained mix.

Richie nurtured this orchid in his green house and although it grew never took off, so needing space for other orchids moved it outside under a shrub and using the old adage "neglect is the best way to grow orchids" found that it thrived, grew in size and flowered. Sorry to give away your secrets Richie.

### ***Dendrobium Victoria Reginae* grown by Lee Buivids**

Commonly called "Queen Victoria's *Dendrobium*". Named by Augustus Loher in 1897 in honour of Queen Victoria who was about to celebrate her sixteenth anniversary on the British throne.

This species comes from the Philippines and is found at elevations of 1300m to 2700m making it a cool growing epiphyte (growable in a shade house in Sydney). This orchid is found growing in deep shade, with good air movement with the roots always growing in damp moss,



thus requires even humidity and moisture throughout the year and can bloom at anytime, sometimes more than once but usually around the end of Summer and into Autumn.

The pendulous nature of this orchid suggests a hanging basket using medium bark or sphagnum moss or mounting is best, if mounting use bush moss around the roots NOT spag. moss. The pendulous pseudobulbs that reach 60cm branching as new growth bears its flowers in small clumps of 3 – 4 flowers from the leafless canes that narrow at the base. The superb blue – lavender flowers that can range through to white can also have a great variation of stripping on the segments of different clones.

I have a couple of small *Victoria reginae* and a couple of Hybrids that all grow well in my Shade house in hanging wood baskets in Co Co and or bark mix with good air movement. The pendulous pseudobulbs hanging among other orchids give a bright display even though the flower count is not spectacular. Easy to grow with little attention needed and few pest worries. Water and fertilise regularly.

### ***Paphiopedilum Sukhakullii* grown by S.T.Ho**

Named after Prasong Sukhakul a Thai orchid grower

A Species from Northern Thailand, growing at elevations of 240m – 1000m making it a hot to warm grower. The areas where it grows in the wild has heavy rain from summer to winter and a cool dry spring. It is found in sandy loam soil and leaf litter along streams with dappled to moderate shade.

The plant has pale to dark green mottled leaves that are up to 13cm long and 5cm wide. There is a single flower. It prefers a temperature range of 17 – 25 deg. C and a hint maybe to induce flowering reduce water in winter. Pot in a well drained mix.

The flower has wide flat petals, showered with hundreds of spots and a nice reddish shaded lip. The petals have fine hairs or "eye lashes" along the upper and lower edges.

Because of the flowers structure this Paph. Is great for Hybridising and there are over 800 hybrids using Paph. Sukhakullii as a parent, grand parent or great grandparent, etc.
