Any senior member who would like to do a potting demonstration is very welcome. The demonstrations will be at 11am and 2pm Saturday and 11am Sunday.

Large plants are needed for our **potting demonstrations**. These size plants are getting harder and harder to come by, but if you have any at home that you would like to give/sell us, it would be greatly appreciated. They can be of any genera as long as they are free from pests and diseases. We have 3 potting demonstrations, 2 on Saturday, 11am and 2pm and 1 on Sunday at 11am. Not only do our sponsors Swane's Nursery, appreciate our demonstrations, but also our visitors see first hand how to break up and re-pot an orchid. Please contact me if you have any large plants available. Thanks.

Cheryl suggests if you only have a few plants and want to avoid getting water in the crown of the plant then you should use a tomato sauce bottle filled with water or your favorite fertiliser. She says it works a treat. A word of warning though ensure you use the right sort of Campbell's because orchids don't go so well with the kind we like.

Things to do When Bored at Meetings

You Grew It

Laelia gouldiana 'Barbara' grown by Jan Robinson **Arpophyllum spicatum Grown By John Costa**

This is a great time of the year for *Laelia* growers with a profusion of colour evident on the show bench at both club meetings and Orchid Shows such as the recent Orchids Out West show.

Jan's plant is a very good example of a well grown *Laelia gouldiana* 'Barbara' which in its native habitat in Mexico grows on tree trunks or branches on the edge of forests at altitudes of 1500-2000m. The plants are often exposed to full sun and strong winds, with hot days and cold nights. Their main growing season is in summer and it is very wet with the plants receiving heavy rain each evening and remaining wet overnight. The next morning strong winds and sunshine quickly dry the plants before rain falls again in the evening. By contrast, the weather is cool and dry in winter and the plants receive little water until misty rain arrives in spring. New growths begin at this time with the new flower spike emerging from the centre of the new growth during summer. The flowers open as the new growth matures in late autumn.

Based on the above information, it would seem reasonable to:

- Grow *L. gouldiana* on a mount (e.g. tree-fern slab or a rough, long-lasting branch of *Casuarina*).
- Hang the plant where it receives good air movement and good light (30-50% shade in summer, less or none in winter).
- Water heavily in summer and early autumn, preferably in the evening, applying liquid fertiliser occasionally.
- After the plant has flowered (usually in late autumn), water only occasionally until spring.
- Then mist the plant daily until new growth appears. At this stage begin the cycle again with heavy watering each evening.

However, as we saw with Jan's plant *Laelia gouldiana* can also be grown and flowered in a pot, using a coarse potting medium in an unheated shadehouse. In reality most of this species is pot grown using the same culture as suggested for mounted plants.

Laelia gouldiana usually carries more flowers of deeper colour than its more common brother *L. anceps* but they are slightly smaller (about 75 mm across). Some botanists once believed that *L. gouldiana* is not a true species but a natural hybrid between *L. anceps* and *L. autumnalis*. All three grow together in the same mountainous regions of Mexico. However, most authorities today regard *L. gouldiana* as a separate species.

Arpophyllum spicatum is one of about five species in the genus *Arpophyllum*, all of them being found in or between Mexico and Venezuela, usually at intermediate to high elevations. The species are characterised by long, rigid, strap-like leaves on slender, cylindrical pseudo-bulbs and they seem well suited to withstand the fierce winds of their mountain habitats.

The combined length of each pseudo-bulb and its solitary leaf on most Australian grown plants of *A. spicatum* is about 600 mm, although it may reach 1.2 m according to some books. The terminal inflorescence bears dozens of small, crowded rose-pink flowers, each held with its lip uppermost.

The buds open in late autumn or early winter and the flowers then last for several weeks. The RHS Manual of Orchids (Ed. J. Stewart, 1995) notes that plants will flower only when extremely pot-bound, which tends to indicate that plants need to be grown into mature specimens.

My own plant is seldom re-potted or divided, being left for about five years before these operations are carried out. When repotted it will go into a coarse medium that dries quickly after watering. It is hung at the edge of the shade house, where it receives maximum light and air movement.

Other *Arpophyllum* species seen occasionally in Australia are *A. alpinum* and *A. giganteum*. I imagine from its name that the former would also grow under the same conditions (as for *A. spicatum*) but I have never grown either species.

Laelia gouldiana grows readily from leafless pseudo-bulbs in the same manner as cymbidiums do from their back bulbs. They 'strike' better if left in pairs.
