- The AOC President also urged members to attend the 2015 Conference in Mackay. It will be held from 18 to 23 September **2015** at the Mackay Entertainment and Convention Centre.
- The Society would like to thank Louise Gannon for her massive effort in organising the Spring Show, as well as all the members who volunteered their time. The lack of support shown by some members who did not commit to assisting was disappointing. Some members who assisted at the show did not write their name on the roster which makes the organisation of the show difficult to manage. Members are asked to appreciate the amount of work that is involved with organising the show and everyone's assistance is appreciated. The raffle was won by Vic.
- As part of the review of the Spring Show, the committee has updated the Sales Table conditions to clarify arrangements as follows:
  - When a plant was removed from the sales bench by a senior member as it was deemed not suitable for sale, it was placed back on the table for sale by the grower. In future the pot will have a red spot sticker placed on it to highlight that it is not worthy of being sold;
  - Some members are using small paper tags on string so that the tags cannot be easily switched but are very easy to lose once they are removed from the plant when sold, and if the tag gets wet, the writing may run. To make the reconciliation less difficult for the Treasurer, the committee agreed that these tags are not to be used. Regular plant tags must be used and be no smaller than 85mm and not cut in half. Members will be encouraged to use the yellow tags on sales table plants to reduce the possibility of tags being swapped.
  - The committee believes that some members may be purchasing plants from wholesalers or nurseries to sell on the sales table in competition with our Sponsor. The committee is concerned that this may affect Swanes' support of our shows and has agreed that these plants cannot be sold on the sales table.

The new conditions for the sales bench will be included in the Bulletin.

- I hope everyone saw this week's Leader front page with the photo of Louise amongst the orchids at the Spring show.
- Rhonda issued the Schoolies Orchid Spectacular one day free pass to members who were at the meeting. For those members who were not present, their tickets will be sent by mail to them. Last year we did not get 50% attendance by members so you are asked to support it this year. The Orchid Spectacular will be held on Friday 3rd to Sunday 5th October. 9:00am to 4:00pm Friday and Saturday, and 9:00am to 3:00pm on Sunday, at Caringbah High School, Cnr Willarong Road and Taren Point Road, Caringbah. Plants for SSOS members will be checked-in on **Wednesday night, Oct. 1 from 7pm to 8.30pm**. After booking-in your plants it would be appreciated if you could help set up the vendor area with tables and black plastic. Sales bench plants can be dropped off on Thursday or throughout the following show days. Please do not come to the School on Thursday unless it is absolutely necessary as Societies will be setting up their displays and any extra people may only get in the way. The prize presentation is at 3pm on Sunday, after which you can pick up your plants. You can get in 'free' at 2.45pm on Sunday. Your assistance with cleaning the hall on Sunday, would be greatly appreciated.

Di for those who don't know is the source of the wonderful home baked cookies and slice which routinely get passed around amongst the tireless workers. But guess what for all those who love the cookies and slice but want it more than twice a year, I have secured the recipes for these two delicious treats so you can now all make them at home. Thanks so much Di.

### Raw Peanut Biscuits

Ingredients:

1 egg  
Pinch of Salt  
¾ cup of sugar  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
2 teaspoon cocoa  
1 ½ cups of self raising flour  
125g margarine  
250g raw peanuts

Method:

Beat egg and sugar together, add salt, vanilla, cocoa and peanuts. Add flour. Melt margarine and pour over dry ingredients. Mix well and place in heaped spoonfuls on greased trays. Bake in moderate oven (180°C for 25 minutes).

### White Chocolate Rocky Road

#### INGREDIENTS

4 x 220 blocks white chocolate  
1 pkt raspberry lollies  
1 pkt marshmallows

#### METHOD

Cut raspberries and marshmallows in half (or leave whole if preferred).  
Place in prepared 7"x 11" lamington tin lined with alfoil.  
Melt chocolate and pour over top.  
Refrigerate until set.  
I found it was easier to cut into pieces before completely set.

## You Grew It

### **Dendrobium aemulum** **Exhibited by J. Costa**

Commonly called the Ironbark orchid, this native species is found growing in rainforest and Ironbark eucalyptus trees across the east coast of Australia and New Caledonia. The white, strongly perfumed flowers likely attract moth pollinators. This species prefers to be mounted in cultivation in similar conditions to other native dendrobiums with adequate light and wet-dry watering periods.



**Coelogyne cristata var. hololeuca**  
**Exhibited by D. Phillip**

Coelogyne species found growing in the montane forests of the Himalayas, Assam, Nepal, Bhutan, Sikkim and Java from 1500-2600 meters. Blooms from winter to spring with flowers perfumed at night attracting moth pollinators. The hololeuca variant is the alba form of the species with the sepals, petals and labellum completely white. Plants can be grown in cool to cold conditions in partial shade with reduced watering in winter.



**Osmoglossum pulchellum**  
**Exhibited by J. Costa**

An Oncidinae species found in montane forests of Mexico, Guatemala, El Salvador, Honduras, Nicaragua and Costa Rica between 1200 and 2600 meters. Produces 4-10 fragrant long lasting flowers. Favours cool conditions similar to other Oncidinae species with medium shade. The inflorescence of this species has a tendency to droop if not supported by a stake.



**Cattleya mossiae**  
**Exhibited by L. Buivids**

A very fragrant and showy cattleya species, always found flowering in relation to springtime. Endemic to Venezuela in warm to cool forests at 900 to 1500 meters, C. mossiae is their national flower emblem. It blooms 4-5 flowers per spike with multiple leads, making it an ideal exhibition species. C. mossiae was the second unifoliate Cattleya species discovered after Cattleya labiata, which was originally scarce or unavailable in cultivation. C. mossiae were plentiful and anyone who had money to spend could buy them, making it one of the major commercial cut-flowers between the 1940's and 1950's. A wonderful Cattleya species for beginners, C. mossiae can grow in a broad range of conditions, being one of the easiest to flower.

## SSOS SALES BENCH CONDITIONS

The Society conducts a sales bench for the purpose of enabling the members to sell their surplus plants. The intention is not to compete with other nurseries/vendors at our shows or with stock sold by our sponsor.

**The following conditions apply to sales bench plants**

1. Only financial members of SSOS may sell their plants on the sales table.
2. All plants sold by any member must be sold from the Society's sales table.
3. Plants sourced from wholesalers or nurseries are not to be sold on the sales table.
4. Plants should be well presented and desirable to buy. They should be well grown and DISEASE FREE. They should be free from weeds, husks, old flower stems or dead leaves etc.
5. All plants are to be well established and secure in the pot and with appropriate root growth and NOT freshly potted. Plants may be staked where applicable.
6. Tags are to be regular plant tags or the same as the example below. Split in half tags are not acceptable. Other tags may be used with prior approval from the committee.
7. Each plant is to have two tags; one with the name of the plant, and also have a guide to the colour (if not in flower), and its growing conditions ie. heat required or green house. The other tag is to have the seller's FULL name in waterproof pen, (not pencil) and it must be legible and have the price in multiples of one dollar, clearly displayed on the same side.
8. The Society is entitled to remove any plant from the sales table that it deems not worthy of sale.
9. The Society, while taking all care, will not be responsible for any loss, damage or theft of plants.
10. Payment by the Society is based on member's sale tags held by the Treasurer or their representative at the end of the show. Lost plants or lost/swapped tags are at the seller's risk and NOT the Society's.
11. The Society collects a 15% commission from all sales. If a member has not assisted during the show or exhibited a plant, a 20% sales commission will apply. The show roster will be used as a record for this purpose. Assisting only on Sunday afternoon does not qualify for the reduced commission.
12. Failure to meet these criteria will result in rejection of plants from the sales table.
